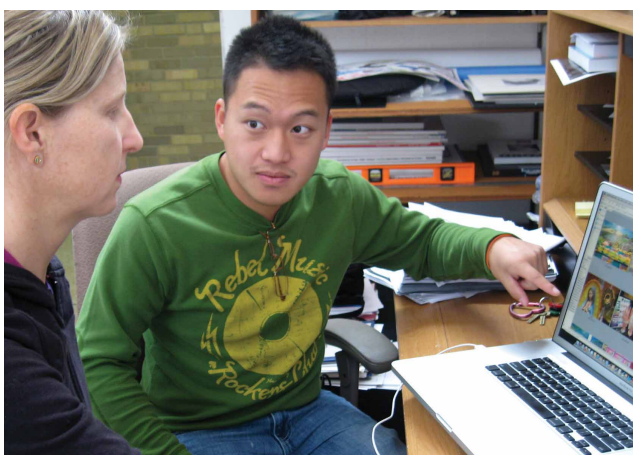




Learning is a lifelong investment

Established in 2007, the Kendall Center focuses on supporting faculty in their continued development as teachers and scholars. This is accomplished in a variety of ways with focuses on effective teaching, scholarship, and continued involvement in Gustavus's learning community. The Kendall Center also works with new faculty by providing an institutional orientation that helps them use the broad perspectives of a liberal arts education to create focused professional plans and coordinates a mentoring program that connects first-year, tenure-track faculty members with experienced Gustavus professors as a way to help them transition to the culture of the College.

A gift to Campaign Gustavus directed to support the Kendall Center will ensure that Gustavus faculty continue to grow as educators and scholars in order to challenge and nurture students. It can also provide resources for professional development accounts, which enable faculty to explore new ways to help students learn and enhance scholarly activities in discipline-specific ways. John S. Kendall '49, distinguished psychology professor and 12th president of Gustavus Adolphus College, was a beloved and respected teacher and leader. He noted, "In each of my roles, I saw how Gustavus supported and encouraged the development and growth of its students.
